Historical Context

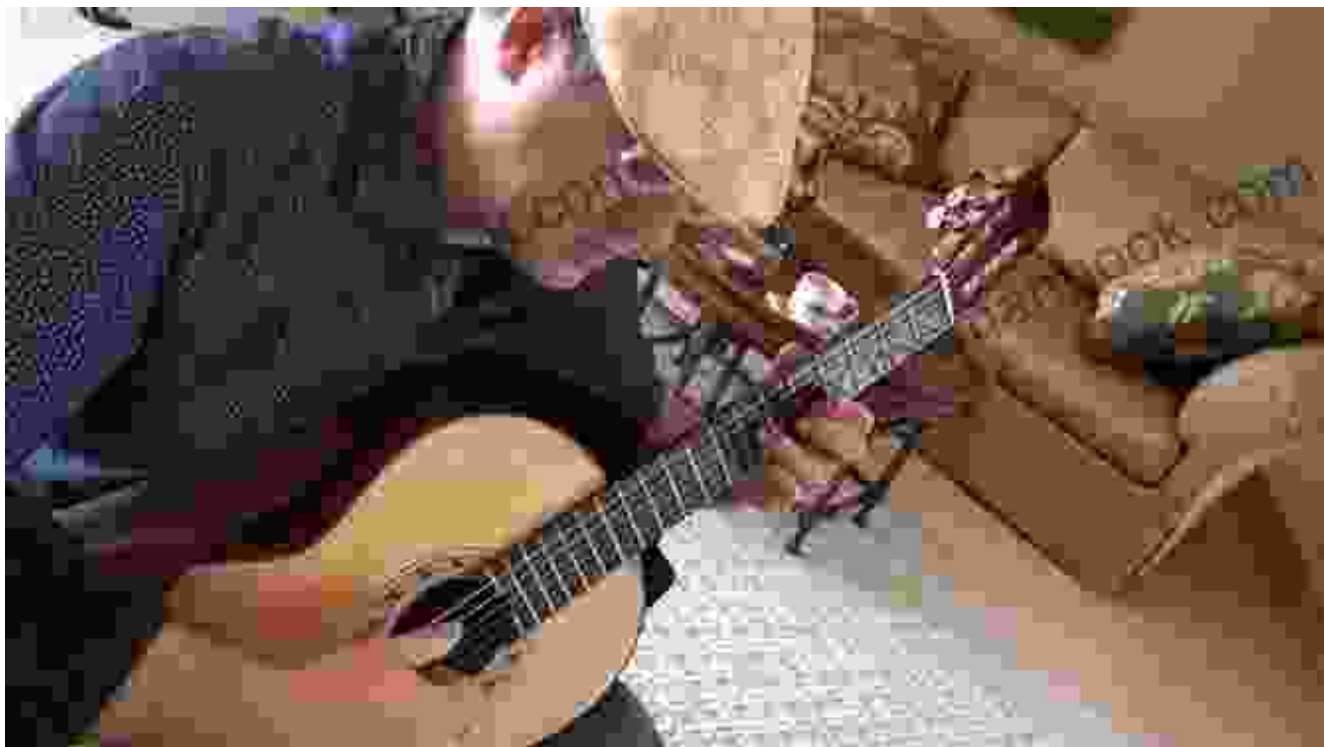

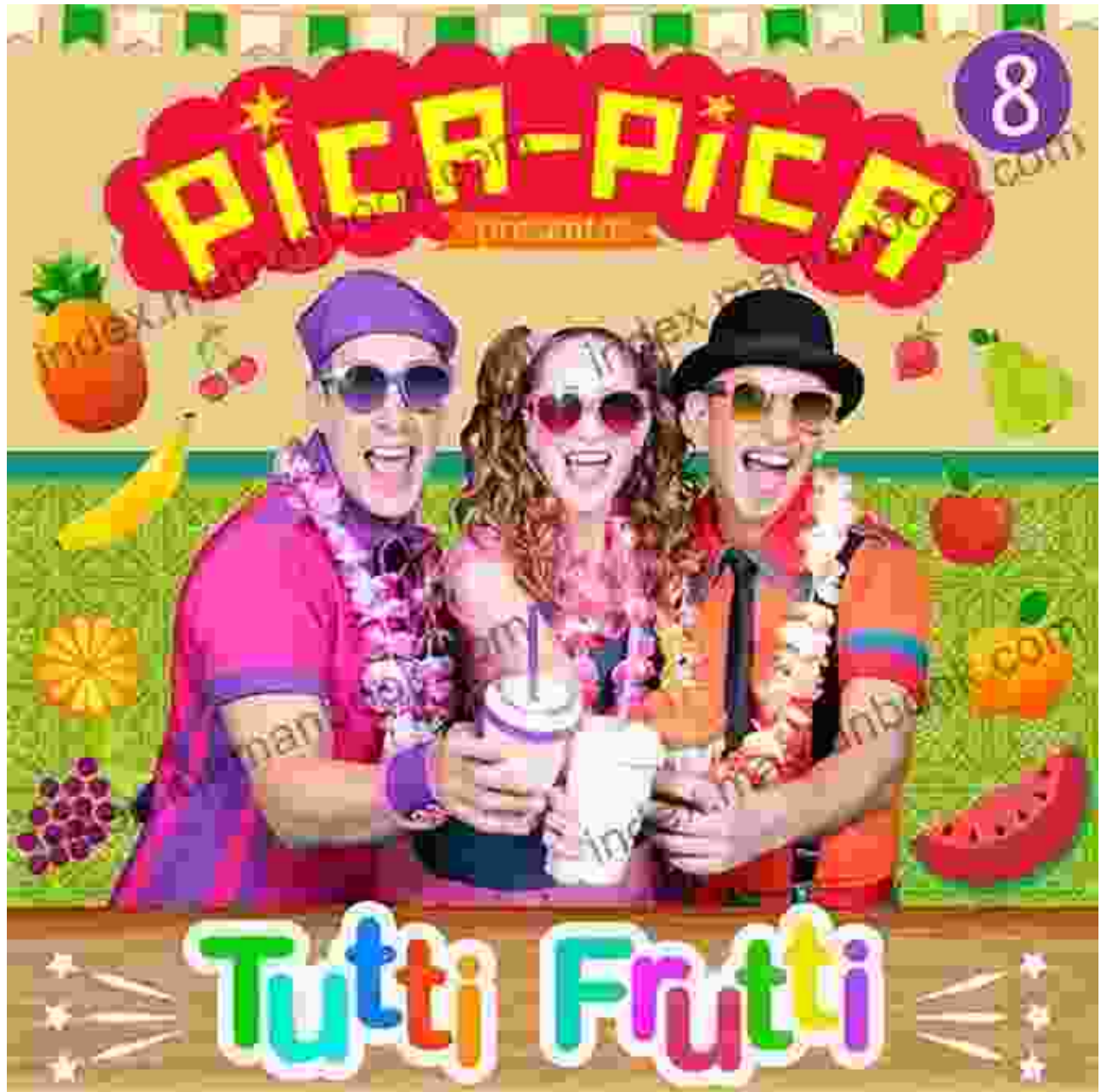

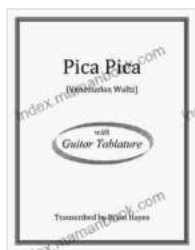
